I collect local news from the North Devon Journal, Holsworthy Post, Western Morning News as well as THE BUZZ magazine. This takes about 2 hours every Sunday for me to select and cut out local news and events for our volunteers to read. However it is becoming more difficult to obtain sufficient news for these one hour cassettes and would welcome news from any source.

We currently have 15 people taking advantage of these cassettes and I know they are enjoyed by all participants who look forward to receiving them in the post every fortnight.

Holsworthy Talking Tapes is a registered charity and therefore can take advantage of free posting which helps with our finances. We are not a talking book system but a local charity providing local news centred on Holsworthy but also extended to the hamlets and outer villages including **FRUE**

I have been providing this service for 38 Years and over this time have received and recorded 100's of news stories. We use Cassettes and whilst I realise these may be considered old fashioned they are considered handy and useful for our listeners.

Do you know anyone that would like to receive these tapes Free of charge or volunteer to join our small team of readers? We meet on a Tuesday evening and can assure you this is not a big commitment as you would read only 4 times per year.

Little did the creator of the reindeer factory, Colin, realise this was to be the start of something very special and something that would now keep him and the whole family very busy in the months leading up to each Christmas since.



Although the reindeers were born five years ago it was in 2001 that tragically and very suddenly, whilst away on their first holiday abroad that Colin and Sheila, lost a son and Paul a very special brother, Mark. A son who had been dependant on someone for all his needs for the whole of his life but always had a smile for everyone. From their loss of Mark the special connection with Little Harbour was born and the family truly believe that Mark is responsible for this wonderful legacy.

Following her retirement as Financial Administrator of Bude Infants School Sheila felt she wanted to spend some time volunteering for a charity. It was about this time that Little Harbour, the only Children's Hospice in Cornwall was being built and immediately she felt this was where she would like to travel on a regular basis. In the following months Sheila passed all the necessary requirements to be accepted as a volunteer and so she began regularly attending Little Harbour. Although she is not qualified to help care for those that visit the hospice she is based on Careside at Little Harbour where she can meet and chat to the children and their families and feels very privileged that she can work alongside the staff who do the wonderful caring.

Little Harbour soon became a very special place for Sheila and very soon this too became a very special charity for the whole Cholwill family. Colin's wooden reindeers who first were made and sold at a local Table Top gradually it seems each Christmas since became the people's favourite. 2017 has seen the birth of Cholwill's Christmas Snowmen and these too are proving popular.

A few weeks ago the Cholwill's were invited to take the reindeers and snowmen to a craft fayre at The Falcon Hotel Bude. 70 reindeers and 30 snowmen were taken. It seemed everyone who came made a bee-line for the stage and within 46 minutes every item taken had been sold! Following the fayre Paul and Stacey set up an order book on social media and again less than 24 hours later it had to close because they thought that the family would not be able to cope with the demand of over 320 reindeers wanted both big and small and 75 snowmen! But they are pleased to report that all orders were met before Christmas.

The Cholwill family are so grateful for the support they have been shown through the sales of the reindeers and the snowmen. "Little did we know that the loss of our precious son, Mark or Sparky as Paul called him, would result in this". Over the last 2 years friends and acquaintances of the family have also given their time and effort into making scarves and bow ties for their fund raiser. Stacey's twin sister Bonnie and Ollie have also willingly given hours of their time to help at the family Christmas factory! Col makes every head of the reindeer, Harvey now grinds some of the bodies, Paul helps put them together and manages the social media page with Stacey, Bonnie and Ella painting the noses. Grandma provides all the cakes, biscuits and drinks plus fitting antlers to every reindeer and knitting. Even little Harry, aged 3 likes to paint the noses using his oversized rubber gloves! A true family affair! Once again Christmas 2017 saw the reindeers travelling the length of Great Britain in the form of family gifts. The family say that Grandad went into the workshop the first week in October and he has only just been let out!!

Colin, Sheila, Paul, Stacey and grandchildren Harvey, Ella and Harry say a huge thank you to everyone for their support once again. We are so pleased to report that since "The Brightest Red Nose Reindeers" were born, five years ago, Cholwill's Reindeer Factory has raised just over £22000 for Little Harbour Children's Hospice in St. Austell. 2017 has been a record year, seeing £9000 being raised this Christmas. The family always request that all of the money raised is spent on equipment or items for the hospice and used for the benefit of the children and the families who regularly spend time at this very special place in Cornwall.

A LOCAL NEWSPAPER CUTTING FROM 17TH JUNE 1999

VILLAGERS' OUTRAGE AT NUMBER OF HOUSES PLANNED FOR BRIDGERULE

A RESIDENTS' Association is being formed in Bridgerule to oppose an application for upwards of 20 new homes because of the lack of need and limited village services.

There are already 61 units that have received planning permission or are being built in Bridgerule and residents have been left wondering where the people are going to come from to fill the houses and also where they are going to work.

Effects on the narrow single track roads and the small village school have also raised concerns.

But the plan for outline permission by Mr A Macintosh for land at Littlebridge Hill has been submitted at a time when Torridge District Council is between local plans, an existing one and a proposed one which are so dramatically different that the decisions taken based on their guidelines would almost certainly be conflicting.

The local plan provides the detailed local basis for making decisions on planning applications and covers a 10 year period.

Principal planning officer at Torridge District Council told the 'Post' that the development being proposed was completely in accordance with planning guidelines in the existing local plan. The question of whether the village needed it or not did not come into it and the land was within the development boundary.

The new draft local plan which will not come into being for some time following its travel through the various council committees and consultation process takes a completely different approach in that it really limits development in villages to that which meets the needs of the community itself.

"We are in a period when both the existing and the new plan carry some weight in making decisions," said Mr Green. "But the new plan will have slightly more importance each time as it goes through the committee, council and later the consultation process in the Autumn.

"We will be required to put the bulk of new development in the larger towns of Bideford, Northam, Holsworthy and Torrington. They are the places with a wider range of services and better communications. We are not encouraged to put large amounts of housing in places with no shops, limited public transport and so on.

"When the new plan comes into action some of the villages will not have anything like the scale of development they have had in the past and Bridgerule is one of these."

As reported in the 'Post' last week a total of 5,450 new homes are planned for Torridge in the next ten years.

Resident of Bridgerule John McLaughlin-Mills said it seemed that developers were "pushing" through planning applications before the guidelines changed and Bridgerule had suddenly been inundated with new housing.

"It is not even as if it is being phased in," he said. "Together with all the permissions already granted and those being built, this development would almost double the size of Bridgerule.

"There is no employment for these people and everyone would have to have a car because the bus services would not be able to cope with it. All the roads into the village are single track and the school is full.

"This would be a disaster for Bridgerule," he said.

Another resident who wishes to remain anonymous said he did not believe the demand was there for all these new houses. In the past ten years 23 new properties had been built and despite the availability of a number of other development sites, there had been no interest.

Villagers have decided to set up a residents' association to fight the planning application.

About 170 people had already signed the petition which was practically "everyone in the village" said Mr McLaughlinMills.

The people of Bridgerule are being supported by Torridge District Councillor Richard Broad who says that the scale of the development is out of keeping with a small village like Bridgerule.

The area ward member said that although the school was getting two temporary classrooms, these would only cater for the children who were already at the school, so that room in the existing building like the hall could be freed up for other school activities.

An over stretched sewerage system and potential traffic problems were also reasons why he would be making strong representations at the Plans meeting at the end of July when the application was likely to be discussed.

When contacted by the 'Post' agent for the applicant Peter Wonnacott issued the following statement: "The land the subject of the application is within the Holsworthy area local plan development boundary for Bridgerule. The local plan was adopted, after public consultation in 1991. As such, it is my view that the application is perfectly acceptable and in line with local plan policy.

"It should be noted that the application is in outline form, which does not necessarily mean that the land will be developed immediately."

There are still many improvements that need to be done to complete the refurbishment, the largest being the replacement of the hall roof and rebuilding part of the front entrance.

Barry William has left us as he is now receiving treatment and we all hope he will be better in the near future. Brian Beadle has left us as he wants to concentrate on other village activities. Raymond Bewes and Barry Marshall have agreed to become committee members and we look forward to welcoming them at our next committee meeting.

IMPROVEMENTS/FUTURE IMPROVEMENTS TO HALL

The hall floor has been completely replaced (and also the 2 side alleyways to the rear kitchen) with Luxury Vinyl Tiles that have a 15 year guarantee. The rear Kitchen has been completely replaced. We are indebted to those volunteers from the village who came to the hall to scrape the bitumen off prior to the laying of the vinyl in the main hall. Thank you so much, it was a difficult job to do! We now need to replace the hall roof with box section insulated roof sheets, dispose of the old asbestos roof sheets by a specialist contractor, rebuild and re-roof the entrance porch. Refurbish the old theatre storage area, construct a new driveway/access to the rear of the hall, repair the play area where the new concrete path is higher than the grassed area. We are delighted to announce that planning permission has now been granted for the replacements of the two roofs.

GRANTS

We have been lucky to have received grants this current year from Torridge District Council £10,000 (courtesy Councillor Ken James), £500 from Devon County Council (courtesy Councillor Barry Parsons), £5000 from Garfield 21

Weston Charitable Foundation, £383 from Waitrose, £500 Lord Amory Trust, TAP Fund £637, £1200.00 Parish Council £500 from the Buzz, and many smaller amounts from local organisations as well as fund raising activities (Johnny Cowling £1700), and Bridgerule Coffee Club £1000, Table Top Sale £1500, Sale of Old Chairs £800.00. Carol Concert £464.

NEW ACTIVITY

We have now held two successful monthly cooked lunches at the hall for members of the community. Two lovely ladies, Fran and Jill one of whom is in catering, and both have the relevant hygiene certificate, have volunteered to do the cooking. The Environmental Health Officer has now completed an inspection and we have been awarded the maximum score of 5 for basic hygiene and compliance.

GENERAL

We have had a few problems with the outreach Post Office over the year. The Post Office Management and Geoffrey Cox M.P. were contacted to try to resolved it. It seemed that the problem was old equipment which has now been replaced and hopefully any problems have now been eradicated. We seem to have been "trouble free" since, so hopefully it has now been sorted. We have been approached by villagers about getting a charging point at the Post Office for electric keys. The Post Office have stated that we would need another phone line at the hall in which to plug in the Pay –station as the one that is already there is dedicated to the Post Office equipment and at the moment cannot be used for anything else. As we haven't got a private telephone line then they are unable at the present time to assist. They have said though that there is the possibility that the Post Office Equipment will be upgraded to a new system and then the Pay Station will become available. Dave Brownwell, The Postmaster, will be happy to do this extra work when it becomes available.

A defibrillator, donated by the British Heart Foundation has been situated by the hall entrance. It is being checked monthly by Matthew Gliddon. The defibrillator has already been taken to be used on three occasions but was not actually actioned but on the fourth occasion it was.

I am indebted to the members of the committee who have been so helpful over the year and have worked tirelessly for the benefit of the users of the hall. Taking over as Chairman was something that I hadn't envisaged and I have been on a very steep learning curve. I would particularly like to thank Sheila Cholwill who is really the person that keeps everything going and who has given me so much helpful advice and encouragement – without her help things would not have got done. I would also thank all those lovely people that support the hall, either by attending functions, or cleaning on a regular basis. Also the Parish Council for being so supportive. Lastly I would also like to extend the committee's grateful thanks Cliff Seymour-Smith who has worked so hard for other people's benefit over many years to get the hall to the position it is in now.
